

# TIMELINE: The Life and Exploits of Sir Francis Drake

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<b>The Exploits of Sir Francis Drake</b>		©DrJohnFreedman
<b>1543</b>	Born in Tavistock, Devon	
<b>1552</b>	Family moved to Kent to escape persecution of Protestants by Catholics	
<b>1556</b>	Apprenticed on a merchant ship trading with France & Holland	
<b>1566</b>	1st voyage to Caribbean, via West Africa, on a slave-trading ship owned by John Hawkins	
<b>1569</b>	2nd slave-trading voyage to Caribbean, with Hawkins, ending with Spanish betrayal and attack	
<b>1570-71</b>	The turn to piracy - gave up commercial ventures- raided Spanish ships in Caribbean	
<b>1572-3</b>	Licensed ('privateer') raid on Nombre de Dios, Panama - taking of the silver-laden mule train	
<b>1577-80</b>	Circumnavigation for plunder & pillage; claims 'New Albion' (N California) for England	
<b>1586</b>	'The Great Expedition' - successful raids on Santo Domingo, Cartagena, St. Augustine	
<b>1587</b>	'Singeing the beard of King Philip' – Raid of Cádiz (and Algarve, Lisbon, Azores)	
<b>1588</b>	Defeat of the Spanish Armada	
<b>1589</b>	The 'English Counter-Armada' expedition - unsuccessful attacks on Coruña and Lisbon	
<b>1596</b>	Drake & Hawkins final expedition: raiding San Juan & Panama- unsuccessful, and both die of illness
